Aberdeen

901 Burrard Street at Barclay

1908 - 1942

John Campbell Gordon (1847-1934), 1st Marquis of Aberdeen and Temair; Governor-General of Canada.

Built on site of **Dawson Primary B** in January 1908 & replaced by **Dawson Annex** on July 1, 1942.

Bayview Community School

2251 Collingwood Street

1914 -

Originally **West Kitsilano**, renamed in September 1914.

Lord Beaconsfield

3663 Penticton Street

1909 -

Earl of Beaconsfield, Benjamin Disraeli (1804-1881); British Prime Minister.

Began in Hastings Townsite at Renfrew Street and East 22nd Avenue. Turned over to Vancouver in 1911 and moved to its new site in January 1915.

1926 - 1928

Replaced by **Renfrew**.

Lord Beaconsfield Annex B

3375 Nootka

1959 - 1963

Replaced by **Nootka**.

Sir Matthew Begbie

1430 Lillooet Street

1930 -

Sir Matthew Begbie (1819-1894), B.C.'s first judge.

Replaced **Franklin Annex**, moving into a new building in September 1930. The **Little School** building was moved to the **Norquay Annex** grounds.

1946 - 1970

Replaced by **Thunderbird**.

L'Ecole Bilingue

1166 West 14th Avenue

1976 -

Opened in September 1973 in **David Lloyd George Annex**. Became **McKechnie Annex** in September 1975. Designated a separate school in 1976. Moved to **Cecil Rhodes** in June 1977 and re-opened with new name in September.

Blind School

1238 Melville Street

1916 - 1922

From May 1, 1916 to September 1919 classes were held in a private home. Taken over by the Provincial Government in 1922.

1913 - 1932

1110 Cotton Drive

Britannia Secondary
1001 Cotton Drive
1909 -
Opened on August 24, 1908 in the **Seymour Elementary** building as part of **Vancouver High School**.
Became a separate entity in 1909 and moved to a new building in January 1910. Also called **East End High** and **Seymour High**. Expanded to a secondary school in 1955.

General Brock
4860 Main Street
1900 -
Sir Isaac Brock (1769-1812); British Major-General; hero of War of 1812.
Originally built in the Municipality of South Vancouver. Also known as **West Vancouver, Westminster Avenue** (May 1906) and **Mountain View** (1908). Moved to a new site in November 1907 and renamed **Brock** in 1911.

Lord Byng Junior High
West 14th Avenue & Crown
Was **Langara** and became part of **Byng Secondary**; now **Ecole Jules Quesnel**.

Lord Byng Secondary

3939 West 16th Avenue
1924 -

Lord Julian Hedworth George Byng (1862-1935); British General and Governor-General of Canada.
Originally in the Municipality of Point Grey when Lord Byng laid the cornerstone. Temporary wooden building opened on **Lord Kitchener's** grounds in September 1924, with the official opening on March 12, 1925.

Campbell Avenue

1898 - 1899
2 rooms rented in a commercial building for overflow students.

Sir Guy Carleton

3250 Kingsway
1895 -

Sir Guy Carleton (1724-1808); British Governor-in-Chief of British North America..
Originally opened in the Municipality of South Vancouver in a storefront, the first building opening in 1896. Names were **East Vancouver** (1895), **Collingwood Heights** (1908) and **Carleton** (1911).

1961 -

Emily Carr (1871-1945); British Columbia painter
Replaced **Edith Cavell Annex A**.

Edith Cavell

500 West 20th Avenue
1920 -

Edith Cavell (1865-1915); British nurse & heroine in World War I

Originally built in the Municipality of South Vancouver and taken over by the Municipality of Point Grey in January 1908.

1930 - 1961

Replaced **Oak Street** and replaced by **Emily Carr**.

Edith Cavell Annex B

550 West 10th Avenue
1963 - 1971

Replaced by **City School**.

Central

210 West Pender Street at Hamilton

1889 - 1946

Opened in temporary structure in August 1889 with a permanent brick building opening in January 1890.

Replaced by the **Vancouver Vocational Institute**.

Champlain #1

East 58th Avenue at Kerr Street

1912 - 1925

Samuel de Champlain (1570-1635); French explorer, cartographer, colonizer, writer, founder of Quebec City

Originally built in the Municipality of South Vancouver as a 2-room frame building for **Carleton's** overflow

Sir Winston Churchill Secondary

1956 -

Sir Winston Churchill (1874-1965); British Prime Minister

Collingwood Heights

Connaught

3323 Wellington Avenue at Rupert Street

1913 - 1928

Duke of Connaught, Prince Arthur William Patrick Albert (1850-1942), Governor-General of Canada and brother of King Edward VII.

Originally built in the Municipality of South Vancouver and replaced by **Norquay Annex A**.

Captain James Cook #1

701 South East Marine Drive at Fraser Street

1928 - 1930

Captain James Cook (1728-1779); English explorer.

Replaced **Simon Fraser #1** and replaced by **Moberly Annex A**.

Captain James Cook #2

3340 East 54th Avenue

1956 -

Replaced **Carleton Annex**.

Captain James Cook Annex

7051 Killarney Street

1965 - 1980

Replaced by **Ecole Anne Hebert**.

George T. Cunningham

2330 East 37th Avenue

1966 -

George T. Cunningham (1889-1965); Vancouver politician & founder of Cunningham Drugs; Chairman of VSB & UBC Board of governors

Replaced **Norquay Annex B**.

Sir William Dawson

935 Helmcken Street at Burrard Street
1888 - 1972

Sir John William Dawson (1820-1899), Canadian geologist and president of McGill University.

Opened in **Dawson Annex A** building (1888) as **West** or **West End**. Moved to new site in 1892 and renamed **Dawson** in 1900. This building became **King George** when a new one was erected for **Dawson** on January 5, 1914 at Burrard and Nelson. Closed in 1972 and used by **City School** and **Ideal School** (1974-1977).

1897 - 1907

This building was used by **West School** (1888-1892). Opened when needed: 1888-1892; 1897; 1903-1907. Also called **Old Burrard Street School** and **Dawson Primary**. Replaced by **Aberdeen**.

Deaf-Oral School

Trafalgar Street and West 11th Avenue
1915 - 1920

Opened March 1, 1915 at Broadway and Clark, moving to East 12th Avenue and Guelph Street in February 1917 and to the old **Baemar School** at 1250 West Broadway the next year. The government took the school over in 1920 and moved it to **Kitsilano Junior High**, then to 4100 West 4th Avenue in May 1922.

District Lot 301 School

1260 East 20th Avenue at Percival Street
1893 - 1911

A one-room government school opened on June 5, 1893 under the supervision of provincial government officials in New Westminster. Another classroom was added in 1900 and the school was eventually turned into a **Trades School**. The land was deeded to Vancouver in April 1911 and the school became **Dickens Annex A**.

James Douglas (1803-1877); Governor of British Columbia.

Originally built in the Municipality of South Vancouver as **Laura Secord #1** and was renamed **Douglas** in 1929.

1540 West Broadway at Granville Street
1893 - 1927

Opened in August 1893 as an elementary school at Granville and West 7th Avenue. Moved to a 4-room building at Broadway and Granville Street in 1895. Replaced by **Fairview High School of Commerce**.

Fairview High

1540 West Broadway at Granville Street
1905 - 1927

Opened on January 5, 1905 and replaced by **Fairview High School of Commerce**.

Fairview High Annex

2251 West 4th Avenue at Yew Street
1905 - 1906

Opened on January 5, 1905 as **Fairview West** or the **New Westminster High School**. Replaced by **Kitsilano Public School**.

Fairview High School of Commerce

1540 West Broadway at Granville Street
1918 - 1963

In September 1918, the commercial classes of **King Edward** moved to a building vacated by **Kitsilano High School** at **Cecil Rhodes** and were renamed the **Cecil Rhodes High School of Commerce** (1920). They then moved to rooms in the **King Edward** building (September 1921 - June 1935) as the **High School of Commerce** and then to Broadway and Granville (1927), replacing **Fairview**. Demolished for the VSB offices.

Fairview High School of Commerce Annex

2251 West 4th Avenue at Yew Street
1935 - 1943

Originally **Fairview West** (1905), then **Kitsilano Public School** (1906), and **Seaview** (1932). Taken over by the RCAF for crash matriculation for World War II veterans. Destroyed by fire (1947) and the surviving building was moved to the **Hudson** site for training custodians.

Fairview Junior High

West 12th Avenue at Oak Street
1922 - 1934

Opened in the basement of **King Edward** as Vancouver's first Junior High, replacing the **Prevocational School**. Amalgamated with **King Edward**.

900 School Green
1977 -

Started in January 1977 in a 1-room portable under the control of **Cecil Rhodes**. Moved to rented premises in September 1977 under the name of **Landbridge** and under the control of **Henry Hudson**. The new building was opened in September 1978.

Sir Sandford Fleming

1401 East 49th Avenue
1912 -

Sir Sandford Fleming (1827-1915); Scottish-Canadian engineer

Originally built in the Municipality of South Vancouver and called **High School**, **South Vancouver High School**, and **Gordon** (1921), becoming **Fleming** in 1928 at amalgamation.

Simon Fraser #1

701 South East Marine Drive at Fraser Street

Simon Fraser (1776-1862); Canadian explorer and fur trader

100 West 15th Avenue

1909 -

Simon Fraser Annex

123 East 6th Avenue

1929 - 1972

Replaced by the **Teacher Centre**.

Garibaldi

1025 Slocan Street

1970 -

Giuseppe Garibaldi (1807-1882); Italian patriot

Is **Nelson Annex C**, renamed in 1973.

Gladstone Secondary

4105 Gladstone Street

1950 -

Street, which was named for Sir William Ewart Gladstone (1809-1898); British Prime Minister

General Gordon #1

1401 East 49th Avenue at Knight Street

1921 - 1928

General Charles Gordon (1833-1885); British soldier

General Gordon #2

2896 West 6th Avenue

1912 -

Grand View

East 1st Avenue and Park Drive

1905 - 1926

Named for the view.

Replaced by **Britannia High Annex**.

See **Grandview High School of Commerce** and **Grandview**.

Grandview/?uuqinak'uuh

2055 Woodland Drive
1905 -

Moved from old site in 1926 and called **Grandview** until 1932, when it was renamed the **Grandview High School of Commerce** but changed back to **Grandview** when this school was demolished in 1954.

Grandview High School of Commerce

East 1st Avenue and Commercial Drive
1932 - 1950

The **Britannia High** department of Commerce opened in 1913. Five classes moved to Dickens in 1926, then to the **Grand View Elementary** building in the spring of 1927. This became the **Grandview High School of Commerce** in 1932 and was consolidated with **Vancouver Technical** in 1950. The building was demolished in 1954.

Granville

Granville George Leveson-Gower, the 2nd Earl of Granville (1815-1891), Secretary of State for the Colonies.

1921 - 1929

Sir Wilfred Grenfell (1865-1940); English physician and missionary
Temporary 4-room building in Hastings Townsite.

1963 - 1968

Replaced by **Bruce**.

Eric Hamber Secondary

Eric Hamber (1880-1960); Lieutenant-Governor of B.C.; Chancellor of UBC

Hastings

2625 Franklin Street
1908 -

Rear-Admiral George Hastings (1814-1876); British Commander of Pacific Squadron

A wooden building was deeded to the city when Hastings Townsite was taken over on July 1, 1911.

600 South Nootka
1956 - 1964

Replaced by **Lord**.

Hastings Annex B

2450 Cambridge Street
1965 - 1970; 1982 -

Replaced by **Tillicum** and became an annex of **Hastings** again in 1982, retaining the name **Tillicum**.

Hastings Mill School

1873 - 1886

Opened February 12, 1873 to November 4, 1886 and was also called **Granville School**. The Granville School District was formed when 15 students were found: 6 Millers, 2 Alexanders, 4 Pattersons (including a 4-year old), 2 "half breeds", and a "Kanaka" who had jumped a ship from Honolulu. Had run during 1872 as a part of the Burrard School District in North Vancouver. Closed after the June 13, 1886 fire as the families had scattered. Reopened in November for a month until the **Oppenheimer Street School** was ready. See **Strathcona**.

Ecole Anne Hebert

1979 - 19?

Anne Hebert (1916-); Canadian poet & novelist

Began as **Programme Cadre de Francais** at Jamieson - British Columbia's first French language school.

Took over **Cook Annex** in September 1983 and changed its name.

1962 -

John Henderson, Vancouver engineer; VSB Trustee

Replaced **Fleming Annex**.

1908 -

Kerrydale, a home in Gairloch, Scotland; "little seat of the fairies"

1965 -

King Edward High School

West 12th Avenue and Oak Street

1890 - 1962

King Edward VII (1841-1910)

Moved to this site in January 1905 and renamed **King Edward** in 1909. Replaced by the **King Edward Adult Centre** in 1962, retaining Senior Matriculation and became part of **Vancouver City College** in 1965.

King George V (1865-1936)

Nelson Street at Burrard Street

1914 -

Took over the old **Dawson** building at Burrard and Nelson on August 24, 1914, moving to the new site in 1963.

New site opened in 1963.

Sir Charles Kingsford-Smith

1955 -

Sir Charles Kingsford-Smith (1897-1935); Australian aviator; briefly lived in Vancouver

1914 -

Lord Horatio Herbert Kitchener (1850-1916); British soldier

Originally built in the Municipality of Point Grey.

Lord Kitchener Annex A

West 14th Avenue at Highbury Street

1921 - 1926

Also called **Dunbar Heights**. Moved to new site in 1926 and renamed **Langara**.

Lord Kitchener Annex B

West 24th Avenue and Trafalgar Street

Replaced by **Trafalgar**.

Kitsilano Public

2251 West 4th Avenue at Yew Street

1906 - 1932

Chief Khahtsahlano; hereditary chief of Squamish band

Replaced **Fairview High Annex** and replaced by **Seaview** in 1932.

Kitsilano Secondary

2550 West 10th Avenue

1917 -

First classes, with overflow students from **King Edward**, were held in **Rhodes** (1917), then in **Hudson** (1918), with a new building opening January 5, 1920.

Langara

West 14th Avenue and Crown Street
1921 - 1940

Juan de Langara (1730-1800), Spanish admiral.

Originally built in the Municipality of Point Grey and was also known as **Dunbar Heights** and **Kitchener Annex**. Replaced by **Lord Byng Junior High**, now **L'Ecole Jules Quesnel**, in 1940, when the students moved into the new **Queen Elizabeth**.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier (1814-1919); Canadian Prime Minister

Replaced **David Lloyd George Annex B**.

David Livingstone (1813-1873); Scottish missionary & explorer

David Lloyd George

8370 Cartier Street
1902 -

David Lloyd George (1863-1945); British Prime Minister

Originally built in the Municipality of South Vancouver and taken over by the Municipality of Point Grey in 1908. The first school opened in Marpole in 1899. The students moved to the first **Eburne School**, a 1-room building on West 70th Avenue. In September 1912, the **Eburne Public School** was renamed the **Eburne Superior School** when a group of students formed a First-Year High School Group. The school was renamed the **Marpole and Eburne High School** in September 1913, when a 4-room frame building was opened, with public school classes in both buildings. In 1921, the school was moved to the present site and renamed **David Lloyd George**.

Opened in April 1946 and also called **Shannon Park**. Replaced by **L'Ecole Bilingue** in 1973, still as an annex, and became **McKechnie Annex** in 1975.

Sir William Macdonald

1950 East Hastings Street
1905 -

Sir William Macdonald (1831-1917); tobacco merchant & educational philanthropist.

Began as **Cedar Cove** in temporary buildings at Victoria Drive and Pender Street. A new building at the present site was opened in 1906. Burned on December 7, 1947 and rebuilt.

Sir Alexander Mackenzie #1

East 44th Avenue and Fraser Street
1909 - 1930

Sir Alexander Mackenzie (1764-1820); Scottish explorer & fur trader

Originally opened in the Municipality of South Vancouver in a vacant store at East 43rd Avenue and Fraser Street with the new building opening in September. Moved to 960 East 39th in 1930. The old building became **John Oliver Commercial Annex** and was condemned in the 1950's. The renovated building became **Mackenzie Annex** in 1961 and part of **South Hill** in 1971. It reverted to **Mackenzie Annex** in 1984, after the new part of **South Hill** burned down.

Hugh Crawford Magee (d.1909); first farmer on the North Arm of the Fraser River, at Marine Drive and Balaclava Street.

Magee Secondary #1

1975 West 49th Avenue
1912 -

Originally opened in the Municipality of South Vancouver in Eburne with 8 students, moving to a new building at Easter 1914. First called **Point Grey High**, then **King George V** (1914). Students used the nickname **Magee** to avoid confusion with Vancouver's **King George** and it was officially renamed in 1926.

Magee Secondary #2

1912 -

New building on the same lot.

Maple Grove

6199 Cypress Street
1914 -

Trees in area

Opened in the Municipality of Point Grey as **Magee Public School**, sharing a building with **Magee** from Easter 1914 to January 1925 when it moved to new building on the grounds and renamed **Maple Grove**.

Replaced **David Lloyd George Annex** and became **L'Ecole Bilingue**. Reopened as **Shannon Park** and still an annex.

Walter Moberly

1000 East 59th Avenue
1877 -

Walter Moberly (1832-1915); Canadian explorer & builder of Cariboo Road

Opened in the Wesleyan Church on August 17, 1877 as the first elementary in the Municipality of South Vancouver. Unable to remain open for any length of time until 1880 due to a lack of students. First school building, at Marine Drive and Fraser Street, was known as **North Arm** (1886), then **Simon Fraser** (1925), **Captain Cook** (1928), and **Moberly Annex A** (1930). Present site opened in 1911. Burned June 23, 1945 and reopened in 1946.
